Yes, SRW had to pause...

Yes, SRW had to pause, but thanks to our volunteers, we were able to make a difference even during the pandemic.

For SRW, 2020 got off to a great start, and none of us imagined how quickly things would grind to a halt only a few months into the year. We completed four missions to Honduras (an orthopedic team, hernia team, strabismus team, and pin-and-cast team) before the pandemic. Our last mission team left Honduras on March 1, 2020, and the rest, as they say, is history. Sadly, our hand team's fall mission had to be cancelled, and our dental team did not make it to Honduras at all in 2020 due to COVID-related travel cautions and restrictions.

In January 2021, parents of future patients began calling the Honduran facility where our medical mission teams work, to see when SRW would be returning to offer their children a better future. We do not have an answer for them. Team members are eager to return, but such missions are not deemed safe at this time. In Honduras, vaccines are scarce and expensive.

Since our first mission to Honduras in 2006, we have treated more than 5,140 children and adults. Our eyeglass, prosthetic eye, and dental missions treat adults, but the majority of the 5,140 treated are children from all over Honduras. At least three times that number were screened or seen for consult by our specialists. Others received needed equipment for better mobility or

ease of care.

The pandemic has caused shortages all over the world. But when a shortage concerns life-saving and life-changing health care, it's frustrating for us and for our patients and their parents. Sharing Resources Worldwide plans to return to Honduras as soon as it is safe and possible.

But thanks to our volunteers...

Although several of our warehouse volunteers needed to step back from volunteering at SRW's warehouse during the pandemic, others were able to help SRW keep moving forward.

Two volunteer drivers who have served for some years continued picking up donated supplies and equipment as needed. Whenever

requests for pick-ups came in from hospitals and clinics, Paul Fernholz and Dennis Bakke, retired Ameritech employees, would rent a truck and off they'd go. They have been greatly appreciated by those donating items, and also by SRW staff. Their travels around Madison and from Reedsburg to Beloit enabled SRW to obtain not only provisions for our future missions, but also supplies we could share with other mission groups in the area.

Even during the pandemic supplies were shipped abroad by other groups, and we were able to donate locally. SRW's contributions included sorely needed personal protective equipment which was put to good use rather than collecting dust on our shelves.

In addition to their trucking services, Paul and Dennis often help with other duties in our warehouse. If you have time on your hands and are willing to help SRW with week-day tasks, or if you're ready to return to service after a COVID break, please give Mary Dowling a call.

An Irresistible Dynamic

I have been a nurse now for over 20 years, working at the University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics (UWHC), and the medical missions that SRW has served have been a desire of mine from the time I started. It was now a little over 10 years ago that I got my opportunity and I have not looked back since. From the moment we arrived at the clinic I knew I was coming back. The team, the patients and families we serve and the community create an irresistible dynamic.

I have had the fortunate opportunity to participate on the Pediatric Orthopedic team doing predominantly lower extremity surgeries. While the core remains consistent,

there are fun additions each year that just add to the dynamic. What we are able to accomplish is truly remarkable; given this is a group of people that do not routinely work together.

What makes it work?

A shared goal: We are here to help the children and families before us.

The creative problem solving is one of my favorite challenges. I still



remember when a bolt cutter (affectionately called “the bike stealer”) was needed to cut pins, and what was produced was just that. It was in that moment we realized we did not have a way to sterilize such a large device. Over the years we have come up with multiple iterations on how best to use said device while maintaining the sterility of the field. We look at what is before us and how can we maximize its use. The cuffed sleeves of a surgical gown can be stockinette under a cast, a wooden broom handle can be cut to make spacers for a cast. One year the clinic in Honduras had wheelchairs they were assembling using a plastic lawn chair and bicycle wheels — genius!

The most eye opening, awe inspiring day... clinic day. We arrive to a lawn full of hopeful faces, including our own. As we begin seeing patients I am in amazement at the respect and care they bring to us. Parents willing to entrust

total strangers to help their child with very little time to build and foster a relationship. Yet, I find evidence that we do, in the number that come back year to year for follow up, or to introduce us to a new patient or to just say hi. In seeing this, our cross cultural exchange can continue. I learn more from my patients and families than they will ever learn from me.

A medical mission is an opportunity to work in health care in its purist form, constrained only by the limited time we are there. It reminds me each year why I went into nursing. While we do not

yet know the timing of the next mission, I am pretty sure I can speak for all when I say we are anxiously waiting and ready to serve. ●
